3) Regulatory and legal issues

The Air Navigation Order was changed in August 2021 to allow 600kg microlights. The BMAA is now working with aircraft suppliers to bring new, heavier microlights to the UK. We are calling these new aircraft 'Light Sport Microlights'.

The BMAA has collaborated with the Czech LAA and the German DULV to compare design approval codes. The result is that an aeroplane which meets the German/Czech design codes will only need to provide design approval information for the parts in the UK code that are different from the German/Czech codes. This will make the import and export of aircraft easier.

Numbers of members in our association: 3891

Number of aircraft in permit: Approx. 1600

We have a deregulated (SSDR) category with several hundred aircraft – these do not need an airworthiness permit.
